Our family loves nativities. We've even started our own little crèche collection over the years. A couple are more traditional, some are more abstract. One a friend brought back from a mission trip to Africa. Another, made out of a coconut, my brother gave us from his work in Haiti. So you can image our delight when we learned of the annual Mepkin Abbey Crèche Festival. It's a yearly tradition for our family now. The two pictures I've included are from local artists, and I'd like you to notice something... just how "local" they are.

The use of Low Country resources captures me: oyster shells, drift wood, moss, palm fronds, etc. The artists use elements from our own local area to depict the time that Jesus became "local." I love it! This art invites us to ponder the beauty of Christ's incarnation.



Jesus is local. He walked this earth at a particular time, in a particular place, with particular hair, and particular fingerprints. It might be a stretch to call him a "townie," but maybe he was. I think he had a favorite food, a special view he enjoyed, and a "watering hole" he'd frequent. He told stories, laughed, and celebrated friendship. He mingled with outcasts, challenged religious powers, and dined with some "questionable" people. The point here is that God moved into the neighborhood. Jesus became local.




The corrupt status and questionable demographics of the neighborhood didn't keep Jesus from coming. In fact, the messiness of the neighborhood is the very reason he came. That fact that Jesus becomes local means there is...

> No place too far for his love to reach, No tragedy too dark for his light to penetrate, No life too messy for his grace to redeem, No heart too corrupt for his Spirit to enter.

You are likely to see a lot of nativities over the next four weeks. I hope they cause us pause and ponder. This Advent, may we see with fresh eyes the Christ who became purposefully local and welcome him as he draws near to us.

Intentionality in Mission: Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God

Ultimately the Great Commission waits for no committee, congregation, or pastor. You don't set aside time in your schedule to follow Christ. You don't set aside time in your schedule to "go on mission." Mary didn't set aside time in her schedule to carry, give birth to, and raise the Son of God.

Jesus didn't hunker down in front of His disciples with a clipboard and say, "Okay guys, today we're going to visit a leper colony and tomorrow we'll head over to the cribs to minister to some prostitutes. I'm thinking next week we'll head east and hopefully find some blind people. I know you've been wanting to free some demonpossessed people but we're going to hold off until after Passover."

I'd like to share a brief reflection. Abby Palmer had just turned nineteen when we went to Mexico in July. She is no stranger to work and did not have to go to Mexico to learn how. At half my age, she understands twice what I do about loving people. I watched her seek out the gifts God had given each person individually to be used and enjoyed communally. Every man, woman, and child she saw was broken like her, and fearfully and wonderfully made in the image of God like her. No one had to remind her. It wasn't intentional. It was effortless. They knew she wouldn't go back to WiFi and air conditioning and Pottery Barn and talk about how good it felt to help "those people."

Abby is inspired by her mother, Linda Palmer. You've heard of Linda; you've seen her name week after week in the bulletin. She is so much more than an injured woman in pain, fighting with insurance and workers' comp. You want to hear some stories about being an instrument of God's grace both home and abroad? Ask Linda.

It's not that we don't reach out. It's the fact that we congratulate ourselves and each other when we do. We talk a lot about the early church and how we can be more like them. A popular question is, "What would that look like?" but I think we already know what it would look like. We just don't like it. Now, imagine Paul sitting among us in worship services and committee meetings, skimming the countless books, commentaries, and buzzwords that seek to define and formulate mission (some of it might even resemble his own example). Let's ask Paul as if he were here: "What does *this* look like?" Imagine he answers the question with another question. "So... did Pentecost make it over here?"

I confess that I am not inspired by position, numbers, programs, or slogans. I am far more inspired by these words allegedly spoken beside an open grave in 1572. "Here lies a man who neither flattered nor feared any flesh."

The man in the grave was John Knox, known to us as the father of Presbyterianism. I have to wonder how he would answer the same question we posed to Paul a minute ago.

Where We Are, and Where We Are Going! A Reflection of 2017

Hello Parents and Friends of First Presbyterian Church:

It has been a fun year with the youth! We have had everything from crazy lock-ins, to ski trips, to whitewater rafting and more.

This year we have seen several new students become involved with the youth program and grow closer in their relationship with Christ. Our students have really stepped up in sharing their faith with others, and it has been a blessing to witness. This year we have been studying the book of Romans and have currently taken a break. We are in a new series called, "I Once was Lost." We are working with students helping them to understand their own faith and how to share it with others more effectively through relational evangelism. 1 Peter 3:15, "but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect." It has been so encouraging to see our junior high and senior high wrestle with some of these tough questions, being ready to give an account of their faith in Jesus Christ.

We have also begun to participate in more service work with our students, helping them to realize that sharing Jesus with others is not just with their words, and relationships, but also with their hands. We have completed several yard clean up projects and begun a food drive for hurricane relief. We have many more exciting service trips planned for 2018. This was an aspect in our program that was lacking and I think we are headed in the right direction.

The three aspects of our youth program are Head, Heart, and Hands:

Head: We help our students understand the gospel in depth. I think we have had tremendous growth in the program in this area and are continuing to grow. I have seen students who can now truly articulate what "grace" means to them as they have received that in Christ. This was our focus on the first year of my arriving at First Presbyterian.

Heart: This is the worship component, seeing students love God with every aspect of their being not just with music. We have made great strides to worship with our students in multiple areas including "testimony" and "music." We have worship music now at different events in ways that was never done before with this program.

We focused on adding these components in my second year at First Presbyterian.

Hands: This was the area that was lacking the most, and I believe we are heading in the right direction with more service projects planned. Not doing service for service's sake, but doing it in a way to communicate the gospel to those who are truly hurting and in need of healing. An idea we will wrestle with is how to bring "justice" into the world via the gospel message. *This will be our focus going into my 3rd and 4th year here at First Presbyterian*.

The mission of our program is to, "Make Disciples of the next generation reaching UP to God (Heart), IN to one another (Head), and OUT to the world (Hands). I truly believe we are beginning to become a youth program that is making holistic disciples who are living into these three areas of their faith.

Equipped and Encouraged Sunday, Dec. 3 at 12:15 (Lunch Included)




