A Note from Missionary, Joe Yu

Why Mission?

Over the years I have heard many people ask the question of "why mission?" The question seems reasonable enough, there is great need right where we are. Unbelief exists here and all the social dysfunctions of the world we too possess, so why do we need to have a mind for mission?



Throughout the Scriptures, there are many examples of people who saw no reason for mission. Moses, I believe, is one of those people. When the Lord had called him to return to Egypt to lead the people of Israe, it was not an opportunity that he had been seeking. In fact, the thought was so awful that despite having a miraculous encounter with the Creator he openly presents several well-defined answers of why he is the wrong guy. Egypt was not the place for him, it would be dangerous as he is a legitimate outlaw there. Plus, Moses was not the man he was when he was young. For 40 years he forged a simple life herding sheep to provide for his family. So how can an exiled rancher get access to meet the most powerful person in the known world, let alone start demanding a new immigration policy to be implemented. Especially since he was horrible at public speaking. Not to mention the very people he was supposed to help are generational slaves that betrayed him when he tried once before, at a time he actually had some ability to do so. Yet, now to add insult to injury, he was supposed to go to them and tell them that God whom they have never seen was going to rescue them. *Really? Yeah, I don't think so, find someone else.*

Moses was not alone. Even the Apostles after Pentecost, despite very clear instructions from the risen Lord to go to the whole world and make disciples, stayed in Jerusalem. Jonah went the opposite direction, and Jeremiah witnessed no conversions throughout his entire ministry. These were all very normal people seeking to love God and do their best to fulfill their spiritual obligations just like the rest of us. They also were very reasonable with good reasons of why going is sometimes not a good idea. So, then why mission?

When we transcend the answer to its rightful place as defining experience with God which He promises and commands then another door is opened to us.

The Lord does not operate on the basis of our logical outcomes, rather moves in a way to dynamically change our being so that we experience the fullness of existence. Despite the hesitation of Moses, the static disposition of the apostles, the rebellion of Jonah, and the sadness of Jeremiah, our Lord graciously tethered their normal lives to His dynamic power so that they could enjoy the benefit of experiencing the foundational fabric of discipleship – mission.

The outcome for which we should be most thankful. Consider how through a gracious seed (continued on page 2)



of faith unbelievable events occurred making history. God directly and tangibly rescues a nation of slaves while crippling an oppressive global superpower. He entrusts the sacred contract of promise to an unfaithful people, and fulfills the obligations through His own death and resurrection. He commissions and empowers a misfit band of average citizens from an occupied nation to become ambassadors of a supernatural Kingdom that explodes onto the globe. Its reign freeing the oppressed with an unseen reconciliation that when tasted triumphs over death. In times of despair He restores with a touch of His hand that reinvigorates the depressed soul with new life offering promises that vibrate fulfillment continuously. Societies who indulge in their prosperity sourced from the mass misery of others turn their celebration into days of mourning covering their triumphs with sack cloths of repentance in order to taste the grace of God. These are just some of the examples of what mission looked like when saints reconsidered their stance. Imagine for just a moment if God allowed them to follow their logical instincts how would the Gospel have reached us? Even more so the weight of the command that Christ gave is inescapable (Matthew 28:19-20, Mark 16:15-16, Luke 24:47-48).

So then is mission considered to be a heavenly chore that must be accomplished in order for us to receive the treat of Salvation. No, it is instead a delightful compulsion that grows within us that should not be ignored with tangible argumentation. Rather, embraced with faith so that a whole new world will be opened to us where our immortality can be experienced.

Mission is the field for every disciple of Christ to witness the power of God personally. It is the current locus of understanding the reality of who we are in relationship with. It is an endeavor that is not accomplished with a sole act of reluctant obedience, but a projection of current living that bears forth fruit of eternal promise that will be fulfilled with the physical return of our Lord who commissioned the call. So, until that fateful day, mission is a present obligation that invites us to experience the reality of our faith.

Christmas Food Bags


There are 144 people/ families that had a much nicer Christmas due to the generosity of this

Red Cross issues urgent call for blood donations following severe winter weather.

The American Red Cross issued an urgent call for blood and platelet donors of all blood types to give now to help address a winter blood donation shortage. Platelet and type O negative and B negative blood donations — in particular — are critically needed right now. Severe weather with snow storms and

frigid temperatures has had a tremendous impact on blood donations. More than 150 blood drives have already been cancelled this year, causing over 5,500 blood and platelet donations to go uncollected. Further adding to the diminishing supply, hectic holiday schedules, winter weather and an active cold and flu season collectively contributed to more than 28,000 fewer donations that what was needed in November and December.

"Last week's massive winter storm had a significant impact on our blood supply with blood drives cancelled from South Carolina to Maine," said Chris Hrouda, president, Red Cross Blood Services. "The Red Cross is doing everything we can to ensure blood products are available for hospital patients during these difficult winter months, but we need help from our regular donors—as well as those who are willing to donate for the first time—to give as soon as possible."


